ATIA'S STORY

Atia is one of our community volunteers in Mozambique. She visits with people in her community and in nearby communities to tell people about leprosy. When she sees someone who has skin patches that might be leprosy, she refers them to the medical centre for treatment.

For Atia, her own experience of leprosy is essential to her work as a volunteer.

"I use my example to help other people, they can see that on my body there are no more patches. I tell them I am an example! I am already healed and you can also be healed."

Atia has been doing this work since 2020 and she can see the impact she and her fellow volunteers are having on leprosy transmission.

"The number of cases has reduced. Now we find fewer cases than before. I think that it is because all the cases that we have found have gone to the hospital, finished their treatment and are cured. That's why I think that the number has decreased.

"Now there is no reason to be ashamed, no reason to hide this disease because there is a cure for it. Leprosy is curable, that is the message I want to leave. And also that after receiving treatment they should not reject any child, they should stay with the children at home because they will not contaminate any child."



Atia is one of thousands of volunteers supporting The Leprosy Mission's work across the world. Some are involved in finding cases, others support our disability care, and others spread awareness of leprosy through talks and fundraising events. All are a vital part of the work to end leprosy.

ASK 2025 PRAYER DIARY

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WHAT IS LEPROSY?



Leprosy is often considered a disease of the past. In fact, it continues to destroy lives all over the world as one person every two minutes is diagnosed with the disease.

Leprosy is a mildly infectious disease caused by the bacillus *Mycobacterium leprae*. It is most common in places of poverty as overcrowding, poor nutrition, and bad sanitation weaken people's immune systems, so they are less able to fight the disease.

What does leprosy mean for those affected?

Physically

The first signs of leprosy are pale patches with no sensation. Leprosy is curable with a treatment known as Multi Drug Therapy (MDT), but if it goes untreated the consequences can be severe.

M.leprae, the bacillus that causes leprosy, also attacks the nerves of the body, meaning people affected by the disease see changes in their bodies.

These changes can mean people affected by leprosy may lose feeling in their hands and feet, which is dangerous as a cut on the foot from walking on rough terrain goes unnoticed, or a boiling pan is picked up without realising the damage that is being done to the skin. These injuries can lead to ulcers and even amputations in extreme cases.

The damage that leprosy does to nerves around the elbows and knees can also lead to muscle paralysis resulting in clawed hands and drop foot. Paralysis of the eye muscles can eventually lead to blindness.

Acute episodes of inflammation called 'reactions' happen in up to half the people diagnosed with leprosy. Reactions cause

swelling and pain in skin, nerves and eyes, and patients may need to be hospitalised for months.

Socially

The social consequences of leprosy can be as severe as the physical ones. The stigma surrounding leprosy in many communities means that people affected by the disease face incredible levels of discrimination from their communities, friends, and family.

Children will find they are turned away from their schools and their families. Adults are turned away from jobs and from housing. Far too many people affected by leprosy have no choice but to beg in order to get by.

In the coming pages you will see a glimpse of how we are trying to turn the tide on that discrimination across the world.

A LEGACY THAT LASTS FOR GENERATIONS

150 years ago, an Irish couple called Wellesley and Alice were called by God to minister to people suffering with leprosy.

In faith they started The Leprosy Mission. But they couldn't do God's work alone. They needed people like you to stand with them, and with people affected by leprosy.

Since then, thanks to the compassion of people who have left gifts in their Wills, millions of people are living completely transformed lives. But sadly the fight is not over. Kamal is just seven years old and has leprosy. His face bears the tell-tale marks of the disease.

Kamal and the next generation of people with leprosy still need you. When you have provided for your loved ones, would you consider leaving a gift of 1% in your Will to The Leprosy Mission?

Wellesley and Alice's legacy is still felt today. What will your legacy be?

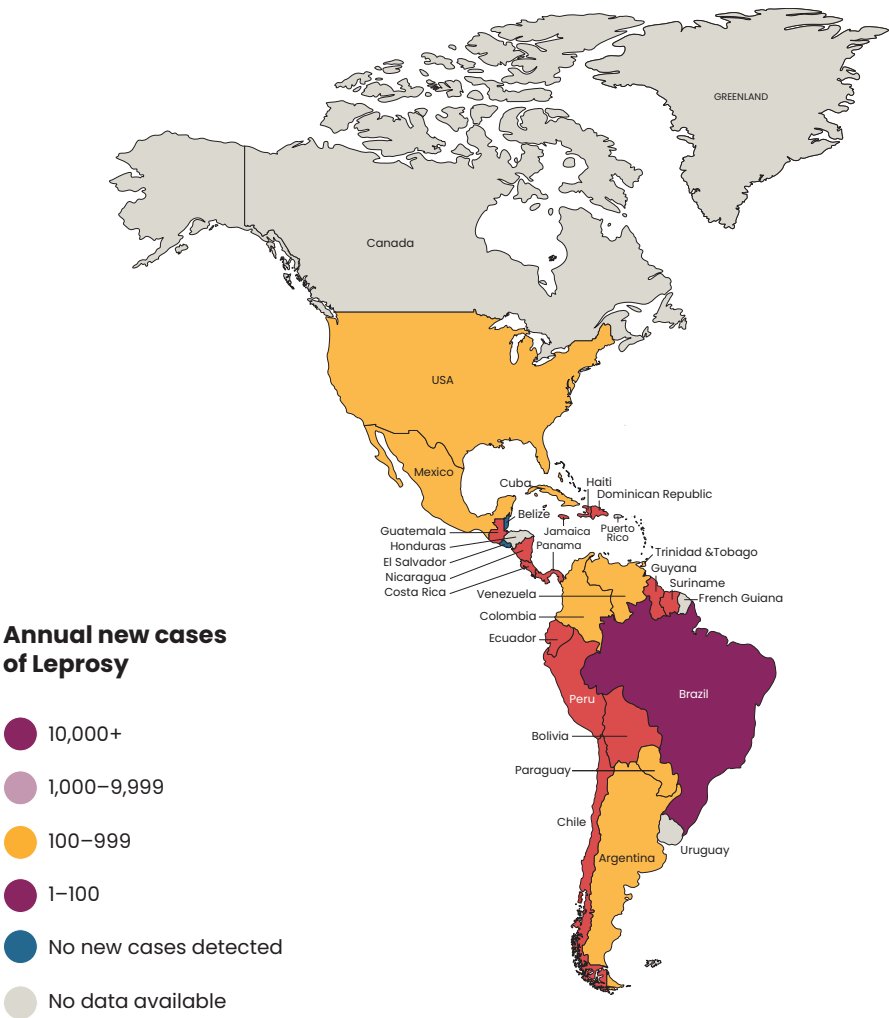

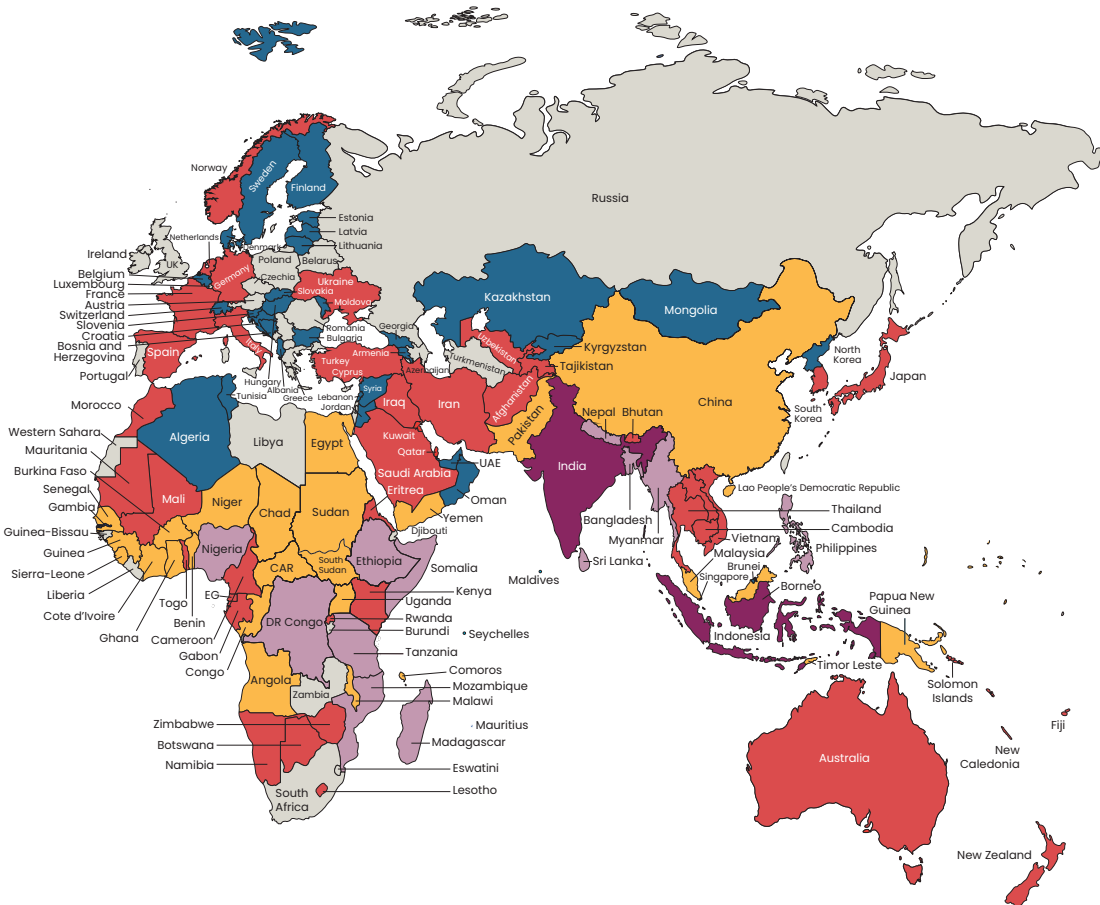

Each of these 27 countries has committed to working together as one to defeat leprosy. We have made commitments to be mutually accountable, to contribute to the shared life of TLM, to uphold our common purpose and identity, and observe financial stewardship.

PRAYER POINTS

WED: Some of our teams live in fragile places, where conflict and the worst affects of the climate crisis can cause havoc. We pray for protection on our teams and that we will be able to continue reaching persons affected by leprosy in those countries.

THU: Throughout each year we are blessed to have moments when we can meet together as a Global Fellowship, sometimes in-person and sometimes virtually. We give thanks for these opportunities and we pray they will run smoothly in 2025.

FRI: The Leprosy Mission is led globally by its Global Fellowship Board of Trustees. We pray for the Board this year. For them it is a transition period as the Chair, Colin Osborne, steps down after many years of service. We give thanks for all that Colin has done and pray that the new Chair will be blessed in their role.

SAT: Amidst the many voices within our Global Fellowship, we pray that the voices of persons affected by leprosy will always be heard clearly and honestly. We pray that we will always respond with humility and an openness to change.

SUN: Christ unites us as a Global Fellowship and so we pray that we always turn to Him – in good times and bad.

As the largest, and perhaps the longest-running leprosy-focussed NGO in India, The Leprosy Mission Trust India (TLMTI) attends to hundreds and thousands of patients every year, trains thousands of young people in different trades, conducts rigorous research on clinical, social, and other aspects of leprosy, and provides training on leprosy.

Staying true to its motto, 'healing, inclusion and dignity of people affected by leprosy, other NTDs and disabilities', TLMTI is heavily invested in generating sustainable livelihoods and empowering underserved communities, especially the ones affected by leprosy.

With God's guidance, TLMTI has been able to hold the hands of people affected by leprosy during their ailing and uncertain times, not just with treatment, but also with interventions that make them financially independent and socially confident. The Divine Timing of God

Psalm 37:7 encourages us to place our trust in God and continue living without worrying, regardless of what happens around us. When we discuss waiting for God's timing, it reminds me of the story of Job. His deep faith and patience in waiting for God's timing is a powerful example for us. Despite enduring severe trials and even being urged by his wife to curse God and die, Job's faith remained steadfast. We should strive to remain calm in God's love, no matter how challenging the situations may be. When we remain calm, God sees our faith, and He speaks to us through His Word, the Bible. When we consider God's timing, patience becomes crucial. When we entrust everything to God, we will experience peace.

Looking at the situation in Myanmar following the military coup that took place in February 2021, I remember that many thought it wouldn't happen, even though there were rumours. Then when it happened, there was anger and desperation and a loss of hope kicked in amongst a generation of young people who had come to enjoy freedom. Peaceful protests began to encourage a return to civilian government, but these fell on deaf ears and ultimately they were cruelly crushed with violent force.

This revolution has extended beyond our expectations. Human rights violations persist, justice remains elusive, and incidents of theft and robbery have risen across the country. Humanitarian organisations face restrictions on their ability to provide aid as freely as before and conditions are deteriorating.

Thousands of families have been forced to leave their homes due to ongoing conflict, resulting in homelessness and separation of families. These challenging circumstances

have disproportionately affected our most vulnerable people. Even our daily activities aimed at supporting those affected by leprosy are increasingly difficult. Beyond physical assistance, there is a growing need for psychological support.

The announcement of the conscription law on February 10, 2024 deeply shocked young people and families, doubling their concerns. The mandatory recruitment of soldiers has begun, leading to arrests. In response to this declaration, many young people, including myself, have begun leaving the country through both official and unofficial means. Witnessing the challenges faced by Myanmar citizens abroad and the unjust treatment of those remaining in the country, I found myself questioning why God allowed these events to unfold and doubting His timing.

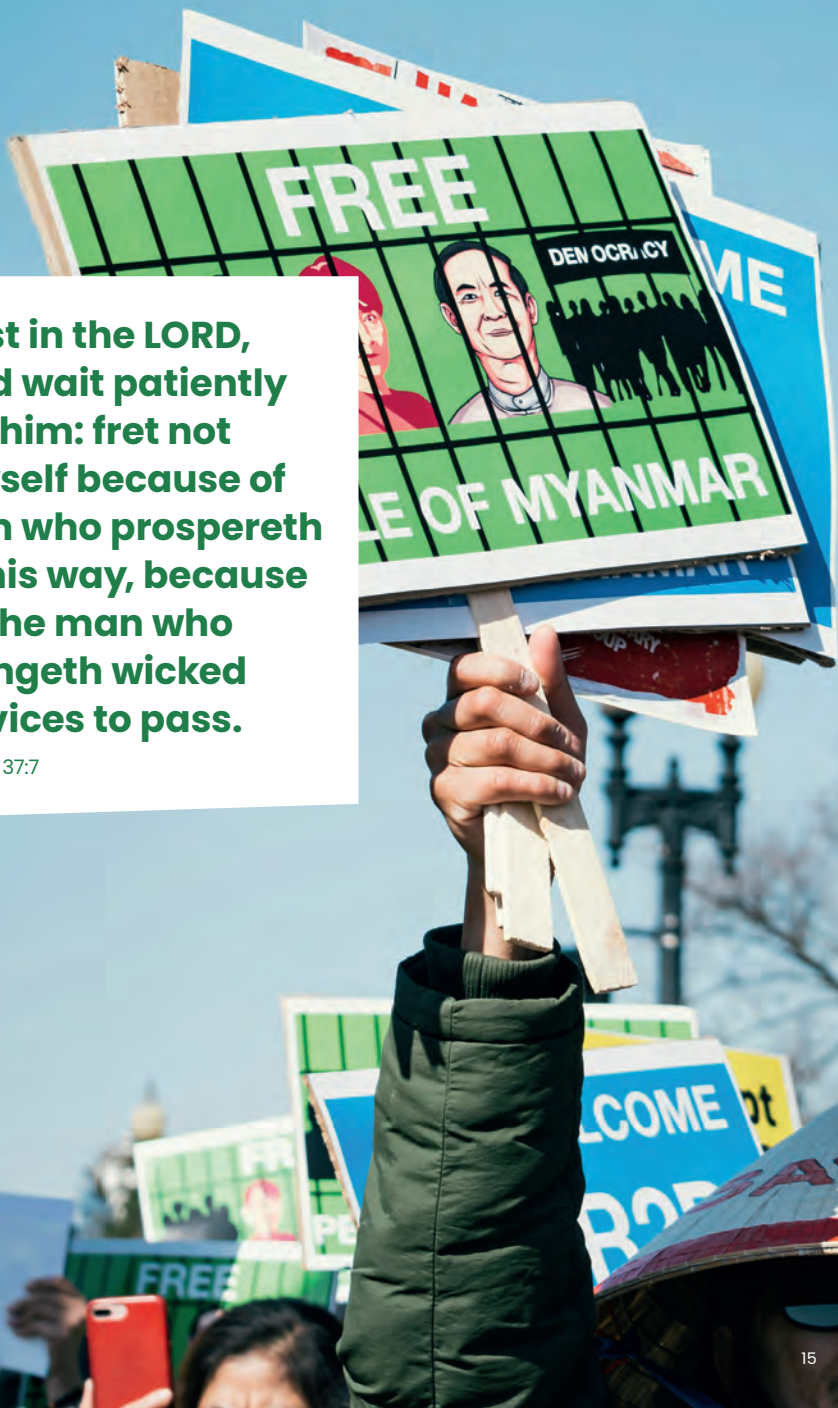
After a few weeks in a foreign land, I participated in our church's noon service via Zoom. During this service, a phrase shared by the pastor deeply touched me: "God's timing surpasses that of scientists and the greatest project planners in this world!" This reminded me to remain calm and patient while awaiting God's timing. Reflecting on the perfect timing of God throughout my life, I realised the importance of building my faith on a solid foundation, much like Job, and believing that blessings will come when His timing arrives.

Therefore, the key is to find solace under the shadow of His wings. As it is difficult to find solace alone, we; families, colleagues, and church communities, must encourage one another, strengthen our resilience, and support those in need, knowing that God's timing is always perfect.

In defeating leprosy, we focus on human rights, poverty reduction and equality. In an increasingly competitive Danish funding market, we do not fear but seek God's guidance to fund sustainable solutions that transform people's lives.

We are proud to stand on the shoulders of a 150-year history of people dedicated to following God's calling to reach out to fellow human beings affected by leprosy. In this first year of the new Global Strategy, we acknowledge the importance of The Leprosy Mission continuing to fund research and implement health projects, vocational training and community-based developments towards social, economic and political inclusion.

Building local leadership within Organisations of Persons Affected by Leprosy to advocate for themselves in their communities, National Leprosy Programmes, and towards the UN is, perhaps, the most significant intervention to achieve sustainable systemic changes. This includes interrupting leprosy transmission, securing access to treatment and rehabilitation, and promoting inclusion.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: In 2024, we renewed our partnership agreement with TLM Bangladesh. Pray that this mutual, long-lasting commitment will deepen the trust in our relationship, promote project innovation and liberate creativity.

TUE: Several Board members have worked at the DBLM Hospital in Bangladesh for many years. Pray that the sustainability plan to position the hospital as a centre of excellence in treating complicated leprosy cases will become a role model for public-private partnerships.

WED: In 2024 we entered a partnership agreement with TLM Ethiopia and started implementing an ambitious project development strategy. Pray that our collaboration will lead to stronger OPLs capable of advocating for accessible and qualified public leprosy treatment and rehabilitation services.

THU: Although a very small organisation within TLM, we try to lift above our weight by promoting advocacy as a significant intervention at project, national and international levels. Pray for God's guidance and wisdom in this endeavour. (see more about advocacy within TLM on p.39)

FRI: Leadership development is key to strengthening the voices of people affected by leprosy. Pray that our community projects will emancipate women to become self-advocating role models in their communities and beyond.

SAT: Since its inception, TLM's Nordic Hub has explored different avenues to build an effective collaboration. Pray that our partnership will succeed in building capacity to secure institutional funding.

SUN: As a praying Global Fellowship, we worship God for his unconditional love, and we praise Jesus Christ for being our redeemer, saviour, healer, advisor and friend.

TLM Bangladesh has entered into a new era: it is now registered as a local organisation called 'The Leprosy Mission Trust Bangladesh' (TLMTB). This means that the organisation is no longer governed by TLM International, but by a Board of Trustees in Bangladesh. This is an exciting and profound moment for our work in Bangladesh, as local people take ownership of local problems.

The Bangladesh programme is divided into four thematic areas: 1) Healthcare; 2) Research; 3) Inclusive Development; and 4) Advocacy. Each thematic area contributes to our goal of 'A Leprosy-free Bangladesh' through stopping transmission, reducing disability and ending discrimination.

MON: Pray for Senior Leadership Team as they lead during a time of significant organisational changes in Bangladesh. Pray for them as they strive to achieve the local and global objectives.

TUE: Pray for all the dedicated staff of TLM Bangladesh, for God's rich blessings in their lives and for their families. We pray they will remain committed to our vision of 'leprosy defeated, lives transformed'.

WED: Pray for stronger partnerships and collaboration with NGOs, churches and community groups as we work together towards achieving 'zero leprosy by 2030' – Bangladesh's national target.

Over the last 10 years, our work has expanded from supporting a few self-help groups and livelihood projects in a handful of communities to working across 18 districts. We partner with district, provincial and national government health programmes, as well as with religious leaders, civil society, and branches of the Leprosy Peoples' Association.

Our efforts include a strong focus on new case detection, raising awareness, and reducing stigma (often using art and drama). We also work on improving nutrition, providing water and sanitation, and strengthening agricultural livelihoods, which involves adaptation to the impact of climate change.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray that TLM and its partners would be able to support district, regional and national Ministry of Health programmes to improve leprosy services.

TUE: Pray that our case-detection projects would be successful in finding more cases of leprosy and equipping communities to support this work.

WED: Pray that planned training for surgeons and physiotherapists would successfully lead to the provision of leprosy reconstructive surgery and aftercare.

THU: Thank God for the expansion of the Leprosy Peoples' Association to many new districts in Sri Lanka. Pray that they would become strong and self-sustainable as they provide peer support and contribute to national and local leprosy interventions.

FRI: Pray for the success of the 'Act 2 Prevent' national leprosy awareness campaign, run in partnership with the Government and involving celebrity influencers.

SAT: People affected by leprosy are being increasingly affected by climate change-related impacts. Pray for efforts to enhance climate resilience and mitigate disasters.

TLM Nigeria (TLMN) works in collaboration with the Government of Nigeria to support the control of leprosy, Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs), and the consequences of these diseases on people across Nigeria.

TLMN ministers to over 33,850 persons living with leprosy and disabilities in various communities spread across 24 states in Nigeria. Last year, Nigeria recorded about 2,000 new cases of leprosy, including children.

TLM Nigeria supports the Federal, State, and Local Governments across leprosy, NTDs, tuberculosis, disabilities, stigma-reduction, dermatology, mental health, gender mainstreaming, and communications. We also raise funds for our important work while finding new ways to learn more about leprosy through research.

CLEMENTINA AND ELISA'S STORY

Clementina is the mother of Elisa, a 5-year-old girl who has leprosy. They now live in Murrocue, Mozambique. Clementina's family used to live in a different village, but they had to flee when insurgents attacked their village in June 2022. They lost everything but were thankful to escape with their children.

When they arrived in Murrocue, TLM-trained volunteers helped them diagnose Elisa's condition. Elisa had spots on her skin for three years, but in their old village, there was no one to help. The volunteers in Murrocue took Elisa to the hospital, where she started treatment.

Clementina is grateful they fled, as it led to Elisa's diagnosis. Despite losing everything, they found out about Elisa's leprosy and could start her treatment. Clementina explains that in their experience, it was volunteers, not health workers, who identified leprosy cases. In a low-resource country like Mozambique, these volunteers are on the front lines of finding new cases of leprosy.

"We just fled with the clothes we had on, we lost everything our house, all our things."

TLM Ethiopia engages with the Ethiopian government, other NGOs, and ENAPAL (Ethiopia's Organisation of Persons Affected by Leprosy). Together we use our expertise and capacity to reduce transmission of leprosy in Ethiopia, to prevent and care for leprosy-related disabilities, and to amplify the voices of persons affected by leprosy and persons with disability.

Our current work includes increasing leprosy knowledge amongst health professionals in the high-endemic area of Woredas so that we can identify new cases. We are also working on campaigns to end stigma and discrimination and programmes that can provide viable, sustainable livelihoods for persons affected by leprosy and persons with disability.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Please join us in placing the safety and security of our beautiful country in the hands of God.

TUE: We pray for better livelihoods for persons affected by leprosy in Ethiopia and that our programmes might help to make that possible.

WED: We pray that we will find ways to access new funding opportunities so that we can narrow the big demand for leprosy services in Ethiopia.

THU: We pray for the laws that protect the rights of persons affected by leprosy to be well implemented and that we will make good use of these legal protections in our work.

FRI: We pray for our partnerships with the government, other NGOs, faith-based organisations, youth volunteers, and academics. We pray these partnerships will grow in strength.

SAT: We are a team that always wants to grow our expertise and skills. We pray that we will have opportunities to do that in 2025.

SUN: We pray that the government will move forward with a programme to distribute rifampicin, an antibiotic that can prevent leprosy.

MYANMAR: Zero Leprosy Transmission

17-23 MAR

“The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged.”

TLM Myanmar works to find new leprosy cases early so that we can end transmission of the disease in Myanmar. Our presence is in Taungoo, Mandalay, Sittwe, Pakokku, Hpa doh and Chaungzon and the country office is based in Yangon.

We aim to improve leprosy knowledge and capacity across the country so that cases are detected early. To do this, we work alongside MAPAL, the Myanmar Association of Persons Affected by Leprosy. More people are encouraged to come forward for leprosy treatment when they hear the stories of persons affected by leprosy, so the MAPAL members are our most powerful assets in the effort to find new cases.

Whilst there is conflict in Myanmar, it is also hard for us to reach some communities, which means that MAPAL members are sometimes our only way to access the communities that need our support.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray for our Board Members and our Senior Leadership Team as they serve and govern TLM Myanmar. Pray for wisdom from God. Pray for TLM Myanmar Staff as they commit to serving the community.

TUE: Please pray for new funding opportunities in 2025, that we will be able to reach persons affected by leprosy across the country.

WED: Please pray for health and safety for all staff and volunteers who are working in different field offices in this extreme weather. Please pray for the health and safety of our teams while serving in hard-to-reach areas; may God protect them from violence and harm amidst the conflict.

THU: Please pray for the Myanmar Association of Persons Affected by Leprosy (MAPAL). Pray for the association to become stronger. Pray that each member will be a blessing to their community.

FRI: Pray for the political situation in Myanmar. Pray that Internally Displaced persons can return to their homes to live peacefully. Pray for a better nation, for order, justice, and peace. All of these things will make zero transmission of leprosy easier to achieve.

These are grassroots organisations whose membership is entirely comprised of people with lived experience of leprosy and their family members. The organisations work to provide for the needs of their members and they speak on behalf of their membership in a variety of ways: when working with NGOs like The Leprosy Mission, when advocating with policymakers, and when engaging with the wider network of Organisations of Persons with Disability.

Thanks to the collective voice of OPLs and their ongoing work, NGOs like The Leprosy Mission are in a better position to serve persons affected by leprosy. Over the coming years, we intend to further strengthen these partnerships so that we can defeat leprosy and transform lives together.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: There are many great leaders within Organisations of Persons Affected by Leprosy. We give thanks for their courage in speaking truth to power and their ability to inspire others to join them.

TUE: In November 2024, The Leprosy Mission launched a new global strategy. This strategy will define how we work in the years running up to 2030 and partnership with OPLs is one of the core themes of the strategy. As we begin to implement our plans, we pray that our efforts to increase partnership with OPLs will be fruitful and well balanced.

WED: Some OPLs are well-established and well-connected, but others are newer and still finding their way. We pray for those newer organisations, that they will grow from strength to strength and that The Leprosy Mission can play a positive role in their growth.

THU: Jesus so often listened to the marginalised voices and picked out the smallest voices in the crowd. We give thanks that there has been movement in that direction across the world, as our cultures have become better at listening to those with lived experience of discrimination. We give thanks also that this trend has found its way into our sector. Because this follows Jesus' example, our world is better for it.

FRI: We pray that, as our partners, OPL leaders will always feel they can be open with The Leprosy Mission's teams and that we will take criticism with humility and an openness to change.

SAT: We pray for the influence that OPLs have within their communities. We pray that they will have a positive influence and that other community leaders will not treat them with discrimination but with openness.

SUN: We pray for the new generation of leaders within OPLs. We pray they will find spaces to have their voices heard and that we will hear the voices of women, children, and the most marginalised break through.

On Earth as it is in Heaven

Tom Holland (the academic, not the Spider-Man) has written a book called *Dominion*, which traces the impact that Christianity has had on the world we live in. He argues that, on a civilizational level we are all Christians, whether or not we believe Jesus was God. This is because Jesus and his followers changed civilisation so much that it would be unrecognisable to the people who came before Christ. We all live in that inheritance now.

The Greco-Roman world was savage. When an unwanted child was born, it would often be dumped in a sewer or drain and left to die. Slavery was pervasive and the head of the household had total rights over all of his property, whether that property was flesh and bone or not. He could abuse them because that was his right.

The gods of antiquity were a vicious and capricious breed who would happily intercede in the lives of men to inflict pain. One approached them with trepidation and fear.

Greco-Roman rulers, meanwhile, were quite content to keep 'the plebeian classes' in servitude and poverty, as that was the natural order of things.

Entering into this milieu was a bizarre teacher from somewhere on the political fringes of Roman civilisation. He lived in a way that is recognisable to people of the 21st Century, but was different to the point of absurdity for citizens of the Roman Empire. What he did went on to change not just the Empire, but everything that has happened since.

I'm not sure I will ever fully grasp what a paradigm shift it was when Jesus spoke to these people of the intrinsic value of every life. It makes sense now, but did it then? Especially for a non-Jewish audience?

In time, they came to understand that he was in fact God Himself. And this was no volatile Roman god, no deified Caesar. He did not intercede in battle to bring victories; instead, he ministered to women who were forced into prostitution, people with disabilities, widows, and infants. His friends were not senators or philosophers; they were foul-mouthed, smelly fishermen. Eventually he was subjected to the shame of crucifixion. He had not won a battle for or against the Empire; he had died as a man at the lowest rung of it. When this is how your God acts, how much does that change your approach to everything?

As Tom Holland explains, it is possible to trace the origins of modern human rights all the way back to how Jesus and his followers changed how we understand the value and freedom of each person.

As part of The Leprosy Mission today, we each stand in this inheritance. The legacy of a man who saw people, their anguish, their powerlessness, and their hope, and he acknowledged it. He made them feel loved in a society that said this was the last thing they should expect.

And this is not a love that he limits according to a person's power, their gender, their faith, their politics, their job, their sexuality, or even whether or not it is easy to like them! He looks at each person and sees someone he made; he sees someone he loves, someone longing to be loved.

It brings me great joy to live out that legacy at TLM. I hope you feel the same, however it is that you contribute to The Leprosy Mission and the building of God's Kingdom on Earth.

For over 70 years, we have researched leprosy and its complications.

Our main programmes are in Bangladesh, India, and Nepal, with a growing initiative in Nigeria.

We operate globally recognised laboratories: Stanley Browne Laboratories in India and Mycobacterial Research Laboratories in Nepal.

Over the next five years, our research will focus on:

1. Diagnostic tools – for both leprosy and leprosy reactions
2. Post-exposure prophylaxis (PEP) – antibiotics to prevent leprosy developing in contacts of newly diagnosed individuals
3. New drugs for leprosy and leprosy reactions. Reactions are inflammatory responses in the skin, nerves, eyes, and other parts of the body.

While we will explore other research areas, these priorities will be our focus in terms of time and resources.

Collaboration is central to our efforts, and we partner with universities and research groups across basic, clinical, operational, and social research fields.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Multiple organisations and countries are developing field-friendly diagnostic tests for leprosy. Pray for the success of the '2B or not 2B Study' in Bangladesh and Nepal. If these tests work, they could change our fight to defeat leprosy by helping us diagnose it quicker.

TUE: In 2025, we're checking in on 161,000 people in the PEP++ study. The current PEP is a single dose of rifampicin, but we hope PEP++ (a mix of different antibiotics) will be better at stopping leprosy from spreading. Pray for the PEP++ team in Bangladesh as they tackle this tough job.

WED: Leprosy reactions are the main cause of disability for those affected. Researchers worldwide are looking for better tests to catch reactions early and for drugs that work better, with fewer side effects. Pray for their success.

THU: Stigma and discrimination remain an issue for persons affected by leprosy. Pray for the study in Niger aimed at understanding and reducing stigma among health workers. Pray the findings help change attitudes in Niger and beyond.

FRI: Leprosy can cause mental ill-health, not just physical ill-health. Pray for our research teams as they seek ways to improve mental health in persons affected. May the results of their work translate into positive change for persons affected by leprosy.

SAT: Pray for the building work happening at our Mycobacterial Research Laboratories building at Anandaban Hospital, that it will be completed successfully. Pray for our other laboratories as they improve infrastructure and install new equipment.

SUN: Publishing scientific papers and presenting at scientific and other conferences is key to disseminating our research findings. Pray for those preparing to attend the International Leprosy Congress in Indonesia (5–9 July).

Bougainville

TLM New Zealand partners with the Autonomous Bougainville Government and the NZ Aid Programme to run the Bougainville Healthy Communities Programme (BHCP). Covering 95% of Bougainville's population, this model improves health, hygiene, and governance. The Leprosy Co-ordinator focuses on finding, diagnosing, and treating leprosy, despite tough terrain and limited health services.

Papua New Guinea (PNG)

The PNG team, driven by love and compassion, works in cities and remote areas. They reach those affected by leprosy, disability, and poverty, spending days in communities to train volunteers, find cases, refer patients, and support development. They also partner with the PNG Government, other NGOs, and churches to help communities tackle economic and environmental challenges.

TLM Finland is a small team, run by voluntary Board members, with a group of volunteers who assist us in mailings and presentations at public events and church visits. We strive to raise awareness about leprosy and the needs of persons affected by the disease, as many in Finland believe that it has disappeared, and the younger generations have never even heard of it.

We have maintained a longstanding partnership with TLM DR Congo to raise funds aimed at transforming the lives of persons affected by leprosy. We regularly appeal to congregations across Finland for support through prayers and church collections. Our communication with supporters is facilitated through newsletters and a periodic magazine published in both Finnish and Swedish. Additionally, we translate the ASK Prayer Diary into Finnish and send it monthly to a dedicated group of supporters.

We work together with other Nordic TLM teams, aiming to be more effective in our work to help those affected by leprosy and to defeat the disease.

Leprosy is a disease that is dreaded in many communities. In these communities, leprosy causes stigma and discrimination. Leprosy is also a disease that can cause chronic illness and severe impairments.

In this context, you can imagine that the moment of being diagnosed with leprosy can be devastating. Too many patients are forced to withdraw from their communities because of rejection, ill-health, and disability. Anxiety, depression, and suicidal thoughts are all too common.

At The Leprosy Mission, we aim to focus on the inner wellbeing of persons affected by leprosy. 'Inner wellbeing' refers to an individual's mental, emotional and spiritual state – how they are feeling, and how well they are able to cope with their day-to-day life, psychologically and socially. This means working to serve people holistically, so that their physical, mental, emotional, spiritual, and social health are all cared for.

We do this work in a number of ways. We train our frontline staff so that they are empathetic listeners with a compassionate heart and are given the freedom to take time to sit with someone who is struggling. We provide basic counselling services and ensure we have appropriate referral pathways for anyone who needs more complex care. We also work within communities to ensure that we stop the myths that surround leprosy, so that no one will face discrimination because of the disease.

PRAYER POINTS

FRI: Please pray for our referral mechanisms. Our teams need to ensure people affected by leprosy are referred to reliable counselling and mental health services. May God guide our team developing these referral systems.

SAT: We pray today for communities where there are people affected by leprosy, that the community members will not treat these individuals with discrimination. We pray for the continuous efforts to put a stop to the myths that surround leprosy.

SUN: We pray for the Holy Spirit to fill our hospitals with peace, rest, and comfort for all visitors and patients. May the Lord bring restoration to everyone working with and cared for by The Leprosy Mission.

Misaun Lepra Timor-Leste works in partnership with the Ministry of Health, the Ministry of Social Solidarity and Inclusion, local churches, and Organisations of Persons with Disability. Together they aim to bring healing, inclusion and the restoration of dignity to the lives of persons affected by leprosy and persons with disability.

Misaun Lepra Timor-Leste is currently running two programmes. One is aiming to end leprosy transmission in Oe-cusse Ambeno (this project is called ELETRA). The other project is focused on preventative health and community empowerment in Liquica, Atauro and Bobonaro (this project is called PHACE).

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Thank God for Misaun Lepra's Board, who are so willing to commit to supporting our work. Please pray for their health and for wisdom in their leadership.

TUE: Pray for the Executive Director and Staff at Misaun Lepra. We pray for God's guidance and wisdom in their work. Please pray for them as they prioritise, that they will be open to new initiatives. Please pray they will work well as a team and be inspired and full of energy.

NAKASI'S STORY

Nakasi lives in a remote village in the Southern Kivu province of DR Congo. Her life changed when she was 30 and she noticed some unusual spots on her skin. She was admitted to hospital and The Leprosy Mission provided her with food and the support she needed during her hospital stay.

Nakasi's husband had already been diagnosed with leprosy and so she did not face discrimination within her family. However, her community began to treat Nakasi differently.

They wouldn't allow her to fetch water from the stream running right below her house, although she had always done that before. Likewise, she was not allowed to do the washing in the stream, instead she had to go down the mountain a few kilometers away to wash the clothes. This discrimination went on during the entire time of her treatment. Nakasi kept wondering "When will this discrimination come to an end?"

When the staff from The Leprosy Mission made house calls, the neighbours started to realise that maybe leprosy wasn't as contagious as they had thought. As the staff explained to them that Nakasi no longer was contagious, they started to slowly rethink, even if it took more than a year before Nakasi was allowed to use the water from the stream.



The Leprosy Mission started a self-help group, consisting of 12 members, to provide microloans. That way she could get a loan of 5 dollars to start up her selling of firewood. Nakasi picked the firewood locally and then sold it in Bukavu.

Since these days, Nakasi has used her entrepreneurial spirit to provide for her family and find new ways to bring in money, even after her husband died. Her dream is a better life for her grandchildren.

The Advocacy and Communications team enables The Leprosy Mission's efforts to achieve zero transmission, zero disability, and zero discrimination. To that end, the team partners with other teams within The Leprosy Mission Trust India, as well as external stakeholders, to develop and implement campaigns to raise awareness of leprosy in endemic areas and among underserved communities.

The team works closely with the state and national governments to push for repealing laws that discriminate on the grounds of leprosy. They ensure those in positions of power are aware of how stigma and discrimination create barriers to achieving a leprosy-free India. The team represents TLM in domestic and international events and contributes thought leadership to conversations and literature on leprosy and other disabilities.

They also run training programmes on the social consequences of leprosy for individuals and organisations. This training helps to create an enabling environment for persons affected by leprosy.

When we speak about our Global Voice, we are speaking of our work to secure the rights of persons affected by leprosy and hold governments to account in the fight to defeat leprosy across the world.

A world free from leprosy will require governments to commit their resources to detecting, treating, and preventing leprosy. It will also mean governments providing rehabilitation and ongoing care services for those with leprosy-related disabilities. Beyond the physical consequences of leprosy, governments also have a responsibility to ensure that persons affected by leprosy do not face discrimination and can access their rights to work, education, family, and more.

We advocate for these issues at the local, national, and international level. We do this work in close partnership with Organisations of Persons Affected by Leprosy. Their voices add weight and legitimacy to every message we share with governments. When they make demands of governments, they do so out of lived experience and as citizens whose rights should be secure.

The Maltese government have been committed partners in the fight to repeal laws that discriminate against persons affected by leprosy, starting with the law in their own country.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: So much of our work in this area relies on strong partnerships. Please pray that we will have strong partners and that we ourselves will be valuable partners.

TUE: When governments consult on the accessibility of their services and responses to emergencies, they do so through the disability sector. It is important that Organisations of Persons Affected by Leprosy have their voices heard in these consultations, so we pray for a stronger connection with the wider disability sector.

WED: Today we pray for our work to engage governments in our efforts to interrupt the transmission of leprosy. We pray they will be motivated to conduct active case finding activities and distribute preventative medication.

THU: Across the world, there are still more than 100 laws that discriminate against people on the basis of a leprosy diagnosis. Please pray for perseverance for our teams as they work to repeal these laws. We pray that in time all these laws will be repealed.

FRI: Many persons affected by leprosy do not have adequate rehabilitation services near where they live. Please pray that governments will find the resources to provide adequate rehabilitation services for persons affected by leprosy and the many others who need them. Pray for our teams as they engage with governments on this issue, that they may speak with wisdom.

SAT: We pray today for Organisations of Persons Affected by Leprosy, that these organisations may go from strength to strength and increasingly find their voice as they speak with decision makers.

SUN: The Leprosy Mission has a new working group dedicated to the issue of advocacy. We pray that the members of this group will speak with wisdom and guide the work of TLM's advocacy to even greater impact.



The Leprosy Mission has been working in DR Congo for more than 50 years. After Algeria, DR Congo is the second largest country in Africa and is the 11th largest in the world. The Leprosy Mission is present in six of DR Congo's 26 provinces, running more than 10 projects focused on achieving zero leprosy.

The team works in partnership with the government, churches, and OPALCO (DRC's Organisation of Persons Affected by Leprosy). Alongside these partners, TLM Congo's 26 staff members are fully committed to the fight to defeat leprosy in DR Congo. This means finding new cases, caring for leprosy-related disabilities, and supporting persons affected by leprosy with their mental health.

SAT: We give thanks for people across Congo who give of their own resources to support the most vulnerable. (Matthew 10:42)

SUN: We pray that our team will always remember these words, "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6-7)

Indonesia ranks third in the world for the number of leprosy cases. The Leprosy Mission does not have staff in Indonesia, but works on three projects on the island of Java through our partner, Yayasan NLR Indonesia. This happens thanks to funds from TLM offices in Australia, New Zealand, the Netherlands, and Belgium.

The PEPCOM (Post Exposure Prophylaxis in Community) project (funded by New Zealand) supports the work of the local health facilities in Indramayu. This happens through three interventions: intensified efforts to search for cases, providing a preventative antibiotic to contacts of someone newly diagnosed with leprosy, and strengthening community involvement and empowerment.

Two projects, Leprosy Friendly Villages and the Urban Leprosy Project (both funded by Australia), work towards zero transmission. The Leprosy Friendly Villages project operates in Kuningan, which is in rural West Java. The project works to reduce stigma and discrimination so that we can establish villages that are supportive of leprosy diagnosis work.

The Urban Leprosy project in Bekasi works in urban, informal settlements in a district near Jakarta. The project aims to increase the number of people who are diagnosed and treated through the public and private health sectors.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray for good discussions between Yayasan NLR Indonesia and TLM Australia as they prepare to set up and implement at least one new project in the second half of 2025.

TUE: Pray for more churches and Christian organisations in Indonesia to become aware of the need to support people with leprosy to live lives of dignity and purpose.

WED: Pray for the project team as they re-establish partnerships with local governments and advocate for leprosy to be included in local budgets after the change over of government in 2024.

THU: Give thanks to God that successful advocacy efforts under the Leprosy Friendly Villages project have resulted in the Kuningan district government establishing a regulation that all villages must implement a leprosy control programme. Pray that more districts will follow suit.

FRI: Pray for Phase II of the PEPCOM project. Pray that community leaders, religious leaders, and other influential people in the society will join this initiative willingly and become advocates for the project's goals.

SAT/SUN: Pray for Phase II of the PEPCOM project. In Phase II, the project will identify networks of other organisations that are advocating for the inclusion of vulnerable communities. This includes minorities, persons with disabilities, persons affected by leprosy, and others. Pray that we can work together with them to help vulnerable people access their rights without stigma or discrimination.



A world without leprosy is closer than ever before because of the work of faith groups. Because of this, churches are a crucial partner for The Leprosy Mission. This partnership is so central to our operations that it has been given special mention in our new global strategy.

Churches across the world play a variety of roles in the fight to defeat leprosy. Some provide sign-posting services for persons affected by leprosy. Others give regularly and selflessly to our work. There are some that have even been trained to offer direct services to persons affected by leprosy, supporting them with self-care and rehabilitation. All follow in the footsteps of Christ.

The team at TLM Chad supports leprosy work in the Guéra and Salamat provinces of the country in collaboration with the national government and their partners, the Fondation Raoul Follereau. The team also provides technical support to active case finding activities in refugee camps towards the North East of the country, where over a million Sudanese people have settled after fleeing the war in Sudan.

Training, supervision and disability prevention are important aspects of the work, as well as the provision of orthopaedic appliances and walking aids (adapted shoes, crutches, prostheses, and tricycles). These interventions promote mobility and allow persons affected by leprosy to participate in community life.

The team in Chad also run small-scale community based projects that aim to increase the inclusion of persons affected by leprosy within their communities. They also support children and adults who are struggling with their mental health.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Leprosy work in Chad is not an easy task. Please pray for the safety of our teams as they travel across the country to encourage nurses to raise awareness of leprosy and conduct case finding activities.

TUE: Disability prevention is an important aspect of TLM Chad's work. The provision of orthopaedic appliances and walking aids (adapted shoes, prostheses, crutches, bicycles, tricycles and sometimes a donkey) promote mobility and allow people to go back to school, to work, or to socialise. Please pray that more people will be able to engage with their communities thanks to these devices.

WED: The team in Chad work hard to help persons with disability integrate into their communities. Please pray that more and more children and young adults will be able to reintegrate into their communities thanks to our efforts.

THU: Pray for the physiotherapists at Mongo and Am Timan Hospital, who are taking care of patients with pain and disability. Physiotherapy is still new in the Salamat and many more patients are in need of physiotherapy so as to improve their physical health. We pray that we can reach as many people as possible.

FRI: Mental health is a problem in a country affected by disease and poverty. Pray for the student who is currently studying mental health in Cotonou (Benin) and expected to set up a mental health programme in the Guéra on his return in early 2026. May God bless his work.

SAT: Give thanks for the Organisations of Persons with Disability in the Guéra Province. Through their work, they are helping their communities access the food they need during the rainy season, the hardest period of the year.

SUN: Pray for the staff of TLM Chad who are living with disability. We pray that their zeal and courage may invite others to come forward and join in the work for dignity and a fullness of life.

DALAMAR'S STORY



Dalamar, a 50-year-old tea picker from a tea estate in Bangladesh, faced a life-changing moment when she was diagnosed with leprosy during a skin camp at her local health clinic. As the main earner for her family, her diagnosis initially filled her with fear, worrying about the implications for her family's wellbeing. Dalamar works tirelessly, often picking three times the required daily quota of tea leaves to provide for her family, which includes her husband, who is unable to work due to a hip injury, and her sons.

The timely diagnosis of leprosy allowed Dalamar to begin treatment early, preventing severe complications. She received Multi Drug Therapy and continued working, thankful for her ability to support her family and maintain her role in the community. Dalamar's story is one of resilience and community spirit; she and her friends in the tea gardens share food, support each other during work, and find joy even in challenging circumstances.

Dalamar's hopes for the future are simple yet profound: she dreams of her children having good relationships and her grandchildren receiving a good education and better job opportunities.

"As the disease was diagnosed early, and I got the treatment early, I can work and pick leaves in the garden. I can also play with my grandchildren."

With the support of The Leprosy Mission, she is optimistic about her treatment and her ability to continue providing for her family. Dalamar's story highlights the importance of early diagnosis and treatment in managing leprosy and the vital role of community support in overcoming the challenges posed by the disease.

The hospitals offer allied services, including dermatology, ophthalmology, general medicine, general surgery, diabetes care, dental, obstetrics and gynaecology. The hospitals also provide advanced disability management services through a range of orthotic, prosthetic, and surgical interventions.

Healthcare is an essential part of the work of The Leprosy Mission in Bangladesh. Our teams search for new cases of leprosy and raise awareness of the disease across the country. Our hospital in Bangladesh – DBLM Hospital – is the nation’s primary centre for managing the disabilities and complications that leprosy causes.

Scientific research is crucial in our fight to defeat leprosy. In Bangladesh, we collaborate with local academic and research institutions to develop solutions that are tailored to the challenges we see today in Bangladesh. Through our research in Bangladesh, we aim to influence health and social policies by enabling informed decision making.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Our leprosy control teams travel across large parts of the country to search for new cases and to visit clinics and homes to follow up on registered patients. We pray for their safety and protection through all their travels.

TUE: In all our projects, we want to be doing the right things. Pray for robust monitoring, evaluation and learning processes across our healthcare project work.

WED: We know we cannot achieve zero leprosy on our own. Pray for our partnerships with local NGOs in existing and new geographical areas. Ask God to strengthen our effort to reach more people and contribute towards zero leprosy transmission.

THU: Pray for plans to improve facilities at DBLM hospital, including the expansion of the laboratory services, so that we can conduct PCR tests to confirm diagnosis of leprosy, and to test for drug resistance.

A major trial on this topic will be completed in mid-2025 and so we pray that the team will be able to enrol enough participants in the study so they can get accurate results.

The Leprosy Mission works to defeat leprosy in countries across Africa and Asia. However, we do not work in every leprosy endemic country. This week we are praying for some countries where leprosy is a problem, but The Leprosy Mission does not work. In these countries, the work to defeat leprosy is supported by our partners.

In Brazil, leprosy is known as Hansen's Disease and the country accounts for the second largest number of new leprosy cases (after India). There are other countries in South America where leprosy is present, such as Colombia, Bolivia, Peru, and Paraguay.

In Africa and Asia, leprosy is present in many countries, including Egypt, Angola, Tanzania, Ghana, Kenya, the Philippines, Thailand, and the Maldives.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: In October 2023, the World Health Organization (WHO) recognised the Maldives as the first nation in the world to have achieved interruption of transmission of leprosy. Thank you Lord for this great achievement! We pray for the end of leprosy transmission in many more countries soon.

TUE: Leprosy control is primarily the work of national governments. Today, we pray for national leprosy programmes and anti-leprosy organisations as they seek to defeat leprosy in countries across the world. May God lead them to where they need to be.

WED: Sometimes a person is infected by leprosy in a leprosy endemic country and then moves to a non-endemic country. Because leprosy takes a long time to develop, it may be many years before they display symptoms. In most non-endemic countries, doctors are not familiar with leprosy, causing delays in diagnosis. We pray for situations like this, that God may lead doctors to the right diagnosis quickly.

THU: Some countries are very close to interrupting leprosy transmission. However, because there is a low caseload of leprosy in these countries, there is often not much leprosy expertise in their health system. The WHO and ILEP (see page 66) are working to connect these countries with leprosy expertise elsewhere. Please pray for these endeavours so that we can see the end of leprosy in more countries in the years to come.

FRI: Please pray for Organisations of Persons Affected by Leprosy in the countries we are praying for this week. May their organisations go from strength to strength.

SAT: Recently, there have been a few new leprosy cases in the USA, however the media has taken this as an opportunity for scaremongering and scapegoating. Please pray for those who have been unnecessarily scared by these headlines and that those who need information about leprosy will find it from reliable sources.

SUN: Today we pray simply for a whole world with no leprosy.

MYANMAR: Disability Work

TLM Myanmar works to ensure persons affected by leprosy and persons with disabilities can participate in and influence Myanmar's society.

TLMM is one of the leading organisations in Myanmar that empowers and enables persons affected by leprosy and persons with disabilities. We work with partners – including many churches – across the country to ensure that their work is disability-inclusive and that persons affected by leprosy are included throughout their work. These partnerships allow us to reach the most remote parts of the country.

Through our workshops, we also provide assistive devices including prostheses and protective footwear, which are difficult to find within local healthcare systems. Sadly, since the start of the conflict in Myanmar, there has been more and more need for prostheses as the fighting injures so many people.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Pray for the health and safety of the rehabilitation workshops team members. They are spread across the country and are often close to conflict areas.

TUE: Churches act as Disability Resource Centres. This means offering basic rehabilitation services and sign posting for more complex needs. Please pray for our work with these churches, that we will have clear communication and fruitful outcomes for all involved.

WED: We are partnering with an increasing number of organisations who would like to receive our disability inclusion training. Please pray that this will ensure leprosy and disability inclusion within their services.

THU: We focus on improving access to quality leprosy and disability services through three orthopaedic and disability rehabilitation centres (workshops) in Taungoo, Sittwe and Pakokku. Please pray for the new dormitory for service users in Taungoo, that it will run smoothly and be a blessing to those who stay there.

FRI: Following on from Thursday's prayer for our workshops, we pray that we will continue to be able to provide prostheses and orthopaedic shoes through these workshops amidst the challenging situation in our country.

SAT: Please pray for TLMM's involvement in a number of consortiums who are responding to the crisis situation in Myanmar. We pray that our work in these consortiums will ensure persons affected by leprosy and disability are included in the emergency responses of humanitarian organisations.

SUN: We pray that persons affected by leprosy and persons with disability across Myanmar will one day be fully included within their communities.

South Korea

In recent years, there has been an increasing number of cases of foreign labourers from Southeast Asia being diagnosed with leprosy in Korea. TLM Korea is praying and working hard to find effective ways to provide quick diagnosis and treatment for new foreign labourers entering the country.

Jesus Hospital, part of TLM Korea, cares for over 400 leprosy patients, elderly people suffering from disabilities caused by leprosy, and their families every year through outpatient treatment in the Leprosy Village around Daegu. Once a month, TLM Korea staff visit the Leprosy Village church to promote good fellowship and faith.

Spain

TLM Spain works to raise money for people affected by leprosy in Nigeria. For years, they have engaged with donors and churches, encouraging them to share in their compassion for persons affected by leprosy. They have no full time staff and work solely through volunteers. Their wonderful supporters have continued to show their love and support towards persons affected by leprosy throughout the difficult years of the pandemic and the economic challenges that have followed.

Walking by Faith

The focus is on Corinthians 5:7, a verse that succinctly captures the essence of the Christian life: walking by faith. This powerful principle encourages us to prioritise our faith over what we can physically see. It reminds us that our belief in things beyond the material world is a guiding force in our lives. Living by faith means trusting in God's plan even when circumstances seem uncertain or challenging. (King David instructs us in Psalm 37:5 to give *our* plans to the Lord: "Commit *your* way to the LORD; *trust* in him, and he *will* act").

It is a reminder that our spiritual perspective can provide a deeper understanding of life's meaning and purpose going beyond what our eyes alone can perceive.

Walking by faith is not the absence of worry; rather it is walking out on God's word knowing that God is working in the unseen world.

Walking by faith requires profound trust in God, believing that he is leading us even when we cannot see the next step. In other words, you don't need empirical evidence to start walking out in divine confidence. The inconsistencies we face in our jobs, our purpose, our passion, our family, the ups and downs of life, they don't allow what you see to make you second guess what God has already said.

Faith requires us to act like it happened before it happens; you need to know I ain't faking it, I am faithing it and because I am faithing it, I can face it.

It is believing in our heart what we have yet to see with our eyes. This kind of faith is not passive; it's an active journey, a continual stepping out into the unknown, confident that God is guiding each move.

This word 'sight' in the original language meant to know or to remember. So in the original text it would read, 'for we walk by faith and not by what I remember or what I know.'

God will create an environment that you don't know so he can stretch the faith you did have.

As we experience God's faithfulness in uncertain times, our trust in His unseen guidance grows, helping us to walk more confidently by faith in the future.

This concept of walking by faith also impacts how we interact with others and how we handle situations in life. It calls us to be people of hope and courage, to encourage others who are struggling with doubt, and to live in a way that reflects our trust in God's good and perfect will.

Let us pray

Heavenly Father, help us to trust deeply in Your unseen hand guiding our lives.

Strengthen our faith to walk by it and not by our limited sight.

May our lives reflect Your Glory as we rely on You completely. Amen.

Anandaban Hospital, located in southern Lalitpur (on the outskirts of Kathmandu), receives a large number of leprosy referrals from all over Nepal and from over the border in India. Its outpatient department is renowned for quality orthopaedic, dermatology and paediatric services, which serve the general community of southern Lalitpur and beyond.

The Mycobacterial Research Laboratories are situated in the grounds of the hospital. The laboratories provide clinical laboratory services as well as conducting important leprosy research. Construction of a new building for the lab started in 2024 and will continue throughout 2025.

TLM Nepal's Training and Technical Support Centre is equipped with a residential training facility. The Centre provides extensive training in leprosy and other Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTD). Through this training we build the capacity of Nepal's Government health staff, national and international medical students, doctors, and community level volunteers.

The Leprosy Mission Niger works in six regions in Niger: Tillabéri, Niamey, Tahoua, Dosso, Zinder, and Maradi. We work with the National Leprosy Control Programme, health professionals in the health system, CSL Danja Hospital, and IDEA-Niger (an association of persons affected by leprosy) among others.

Our key activities include:

- **Leprosy services:** raising awareness of leprosy, active case finding, training and supervision of health workers
- **Community Development:** providing grants and micro credit for income-generating activities such as agriculture and business, a housing project for homeless people affected by leprosy, provision of drinkable water, building of ventilated latrines and promoting hygiene to prevent water borne diseases
- **Support to CSL Danja Hospital:** building the capacity of their multi-disciplinary team so they can prevent disability, provide ulcer care and restore hope, dignity and function
- **Support to IDEA-Niger:** through training in advocacy, empowerment and creating community awareness

LAWAL'S STORY

This is Lawal from Nigeria. He is in his seventies and has 10 children. He first became aware that he had leprosy when he was preparing for his marriage.

"One day I was working on my farm, and I noticed some boils on the back of my hands. I became totally devastated and stopped going to the farm. My in-laws aborted the marriage plans due to my predicament, I cried, and I was sad about it. I left everything to God and accepted my fate when I was taken to a village for treatment. I started getting better and responding to treatment, and came back to the city of Abuja to continue with my treatment and I got healed."

Since his first encounter with leprosy, Lawal has received care from The Leprosy Mission, including three prosthetic limbs.

"How can I not be happy? That an old man like me is being taken care of. Thank you to all the doctors and donors.

"I can't say anything but show my gratitude as you can see, I don't go out begging for alms. I am self-sufficient by the grace of God. I farm to the best of my strength and I trade in firewood, and people transport firewood to me and I sell it."

ILEP and GPZL are two major global leprosy networks through which The Leprosy Mission contributes to the fight to defeat leprosy.

International Federation of Anti-Leprosy Associations (ILEP)

ILEP is a consortium of 14 international not-for-profit organisations, including The Leprosy Mission, with a shared desire to see a world free from leprosy, a goal that none of us can achieve on our own. Through the programmes of its member associations, ILEP spans more than 60 countries and 1,000 project locations worldwide. Most of the global expertise in leprosy resides in ILEP's members and their in-country partners.

Global Partnership for Zero Leprosy (GPZL)

GPZL is a global coalition whose members represent most of the world's stakeholders that are involved in leprosy work. They include the World Health Organization, organisations of persons affected by leprosy, the pharmaceutical company Novartis (which supplies anti-leprosy drugs), ILEP members (such as The Leprosy Mission), and other not-for profits and individuals who share our vision of a world without leprosy. We help to coordinate leprosy work in three areas: accelerating research, partnering with government leprosy programmes, and increasing advocacy to mobilise resources.

SUN: The WHO recently published a leprosy elimination framework that has rekindled a desire to see countries with a few cases of leprosy reach the ultimate goal of no new leprosy cases. Pray for ILEP members who are working with WHO to make this happen.

INDIA: Community Development and Vocational Training

Do you see someone skilled in their work? They will stand before kings; they will not stand before obscure people.

Proverbs 22:29



Stigma and discrimination against persons affected by leprosy creates a disabling environment for them, affecting their socio-economic conditions and their self-esteem.

Through our community-based rehabilitation projects we focus on different age groups, genders, and geographies. Besides working towards financial independence, these projects empower communities to become change agents so that they can raise awareness amongst local leaders on topics such as leprosy, gender equality, human rights, and inclusion. In a country increasingly on the frontline of the climate crisis, TLMTI also has to work with communities to increase their resilience to climate disasters.

We also have six Vocational Training Centres (VTCs) which enrol students from households affected by leprosy as well as other disabilities and marginalised communities. Along with job-oriented technical skills, our VTCs provide holistic education through life skills, disability prevention, and management programmes. Besides providing residential training facilities to help students learn and grow in an enabling environment, each VTC supports its students in getting job placements.

TLM Mozambique trains health workers who help in the process of screening, diagnosing and treating people affected by leprosy. In the area of community development, we aim to make communities self-reliant, resilient, and more inclusive. We want communities in Mozambique where no one is left behind.

In the area of innovation, we have media centres, which are places where community self-care groups meet to discuss and learn about leprosy and other related issues. In low resource settings, where TV and internet access is limited, these media centres are places where people can view videos about leprosy, other health topics, and information related to agriculture and anything else that is relevant to their daily lives.

PRAYER POINTS

MON: Please pray that we will have the financial and technical resources we need to continue our efforts to find new cases of leprosy. We pray that we can expand into new endemic areas of the country and implement our nation's plan for zero leprosy alongside our partners.

TUE: We pray for the creation of community-based groups that are inclusive of women, persons affected by leprosy, persons with disabilities, and other non-communicable diseases. We pray that through these groups we can increase awareness and knowledge of leprosy.

WED: Pray for our partnership with the government and ALEMO, the Organisation of Persons Affected by Leprosy in Mozambique. We pray that we will work well together in our ongoing efforts to find new cases of leprosy.

THU: TLM Mozambique operates media centres where people in communities that don't have access to the internet can learn about leprosy. We are praying for God's guidance as we seek to expand this work through new alliances, funding, and technical expertise.

FRI: We pray for our nation's efforts to distribute an antibiotic that can prevent leprosy. We pray that we will have consistent access to this antibiotic (Rifampicin) and that this project will reach all those who need it.

SAT: Our efforts to end leprosy transmission are stronger when we have data that helps us to understand which areas are leprosy hotspots and which areas are seeing a decline in cases. The Ministry of Health has a new approach to capturing this data and we pray that it will have a positive impact on the work to end leprosy in Mozambique.

SUN: In a country where healthcare is often hard to access in rural areas, we pray that more people will be able to access the health services they need without having to travel long distances. We pray for more rehabilitation services close to leprosy endemic communities.

FRANZISKA'S STORY

Franziska is from Switzerland. She worked as a teacher before attending Wycliffe Missionary Training College in London in the 1970s. Afterwards she served with Wycliffe Bible Translators until her retirement in 2015, but her first contribution to the fight to defeat leprosy came before all of this, when she was a young child.

"Leprosy has been an important part of my life since my remarkable teacher, Hedwig Odenbach, introduced me to it in the 1950s. At that time, "Biblical History" was a formal school subject in Switzerland, but for Frau Odenbach, it was much more.

"She vividly told the story of the ten persons affected by leprosy, focusing on one who discovered white spots on his body. This led to the devastating realisation that he had leprosy, forcing him to leave his family and live in isolation. But hope came when Jesus healed him and the others.

"Our teacher told us that leprosy still exists outside of Europe and that those with the disease are still shunned. But she also mentioned an organisation that helps the sick and provides medication. She invited us to contribute to The Leprosy Mission and I made my first donation, feeling relieved that I could help. This started my connection to The Leprosy Mission at the age of eight.

"That early lesson in generosity and sharing stayed with me. As I grew up, I continued to support others, whether

through my work as a teacher or through my time studying with Wycliffe.

"I've realised that sharing, not just giving, is essential. It connects us and makes us equal. Sharing is a fundamental part of being human, and it's something I've practised all my life. I hope we can all discover the beauty and blessing of sharing."

After first hearing about leprosy at the age of eight, Franziska was not connected with the disease again until later in life. Now, in her mid-70s, she has been supporting the fight to defeat leprosy for more than 25 years. Franziska is one of the many individuals that have given selflessly to the fight to defeat leprosy across so many years.

We extend our thanks to Franziska and to all our supporters; your gifts and your prayers are so gratefully received. We pray that your commitment to this work will one day lead to a world without leprosy.





Norway

TLM Norway has primarily focused on raising funds for Nigeria and India this year. We also gather and receive health and medical equipment like orthotic devices and surgical instruments to support surgery and rehabilitation for persons affected by leprosy. The Leprosy Mission Trust India (TLMTI) conducts research in different areas – laboratory, clinical, operational and social.

The Stanley Browne Laboratory plays a vital role in the development of new diagnostic tools for leprosy and conducting studies to determine whether *M. leprae* is developing resistance to Multi-Drug Therapy. They are also studying the presence of live bacteria in soil and water to determine what role they play in the transmission of leprosy.

The clinical and social research at TLMTI encompasses clinical trials, disability studies, ulcer management, and complication management. Additionally, TLMTI collaborates with like-minded organisations to foster partnerships that support their research goals.

Through these diverse research efforts, TLMTI aims to advance our understanding of leprosy, improving diagnostic and treatment approaches, enhancing disability management, and promoting social initiatives. They have a holistic approach to combating the impact of leprosy on both individuals and communities.

We have all seen the climate disasters that happen across the world each year because of the climate crisis, but what does not often make the headlines is the fact that persons affected by leprosy are among those most impacted.

Leprosy endemic areas are often hit by climate disasters, such as flooding and cyclones in Kolkata, ongoing sea level rises in Bangladesh, cyclones in Myanmar, extreme heat across much of Africa's Sahel region, drought in the Horn of Africa, and a forest fire near Anandaban Hospital in Nepal, to name just a few instances.

These disasters can be a matter of life or death for persons affected by leprosy, and can ruin homes and livelihoods. They also contribute to leprosy transmission, as climate refugees live in close-quarters, where leprosy is more likely to be transmitted.

One example of the impact of the climate crisis comes from Sri Lanka. A small island had been declared leprosy free. However, the local people saw their fishing livelihoods affected by changes to their climate and so they had to look for other employment. Some women from the island travelled to Colombo to work in factories where they contracted leprosy and brought it back to the island. Sadly, this island is no longer leprosy-free.

Santosh tried jobs as a delivery person and shop assistant but faced difficulties due to his disability. He now plans to start a milking buffalo business with his mother to generate income.

Santosh's marriage to Manju, who has cerebral palsy, brought joy with the birth of their daughter. His new motor scooter with stabilisers has given him more independence.

He dreams of providing a stable and happy life for his family.



Pass on the Praise

At The Leprosy Mission, there have been many people who have diligently and quietly offered their lives to the service of God. We have been handed an incredible legacy and if we stop to ponder, we will probably never be able to fathom it. Each person who served has been able to see His face in those affected by leprosy. They saw the pain, rejection, loneliness, anger, sadness and chose to serve in order to make their lives a bit better and worth living.

To a newcomer in the Mission, it may seem like just another job. As King Hezekiah prays in Isaiah 38:19 "The living - they praise you as I am doing today; fathers tell their children about your faithfulness". For a committed person, this job transforms into a vocation, an offering of praise to the One who calls us to minister in His Kingdom.

We, who carry the torch of service, have a responsibility to pass on this spirit of praise. The newcomer may initially see the disease, disfigurement, and the social evils; we must help them foresee healing, beauty and restoration. This change of vision can happen only through praise. 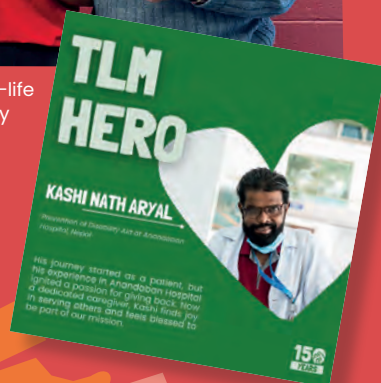

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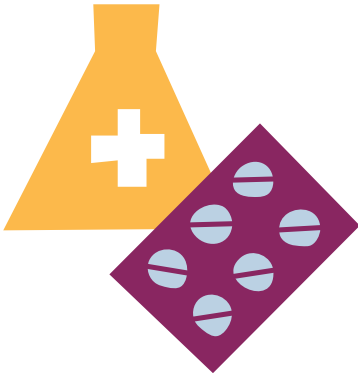
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WHERE WE WORK

The Leprosy Mission Prayer

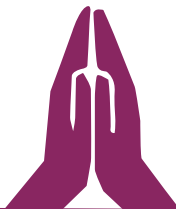
